

REMEMBRANCE DAY - Mixed Media, Contrast, Rhythm

Students use tempera paint and construction paper to make a mixed media collage for Remembrance Day.

Required Time

80 Minutes

Grade Level

Grade 3 to Grade 8

Subject

Materials

Step One

- 1. Select a section of the newspaper to use.
- 2. Cut out a piece 22.9 cm x 30.5 cm (9" x 12").
- 3. Tape it to a plastic placemat.
- 4. Mix blue and yellow together to get a light green colour.
- 5. Add lots of water to a small amount of the colour.
- 6. Paint a thin wash of colour over the newspaper.
- 7. Set it aside to dry.



Step Two

1. Tear small pieces of paper to make poppies.



Step Three

1. Use a glue stick to glue each poppy together.



Step Four

- 1. Mix a variety of shades of green tempera paint.
- 2. Do not add water to the mixtures.
- 3. Paint lots of lines across the paper to add texture and variety.



Step Five

- 1. Play with the arrangement of the poppies until you have a composition that you are satisfied with.
 - think of the rule of thirds when placing the poppies
 - pay attention to the negative spaces
 - let the poppies move your eye through the composition
- 2. Put a small dab of white glue on the centre of the back of the poppies and attach them to the paper.
- 3. Let the unglued edges of the poppies sit out from the paper so they cast a shadow.



Step Six

- 1. When you are satisfied with everything gently remove the masking
- tape.Mount the collage on a piece of contrasting construction paper and view it with fresh eyes.

Learning Goals

Students will be able to:

- compose a mixed media collage using the rule of thirds;
- explain the use of cultural symbolism in their work;
- · use contrast and rhythm to create movement;
- demonstrate technical accomplishment and creativity;
- support their ideas with evidence found in the works.

Extensions

Have students:

- work together as a class to arrange all the individual works into one large class mural;
- use the mural as a backdrop for performances they have created about Remembrance Day, for example, reading a poem; describing a current event related to war; interpretive dance about war and peace; and songs/instrumental works.

Prepare

1. Download images of poppies from the Internet, for example,

Cenotaph Mural Field of Poppies France Poppy

- 2. Download the Contrast, Repetition, Rhythm, Movement and Colour **posters** available on this website.
- 3. Gather, and make available, books about Remembrance Day, for example, *Proud as a Peacock, Brave as a Lion*, by Jane Barclay, and Renne Benoit; *A Poppy Is to Remember*, by Heather Patterson, Ron Lightburn; *What Does Peace Feel Like?* by Vladimir Radunsky; *Remembrance Day*, by Molly Aloian; *In Flanders Fields: The Story of the Poem by John McCrae*, by Linda Granfield, and Janet Wilson; and A Bear in War, by Stephanie Innes, Harry Endrulat, and Brian Deines.
- 4. Review Remembrance Day information available at the Canadian War Museum.
- 5. Preview the John McCrea Heritage Minute at the **Historica Canada** website.
- 6. Preview the information about John McCrea at The Soldier Behind In Flanders Fields.
- 7. Gather background information about John McCrae available on the Canadian Encyclopedia website.
- 8. Review, or introduce the **Rule of Thirds** using the lesson plan available on this website.
- 9. Gather old newspapers.

Introduction

- 1. View and discuss the John McCrae Heritage Minute.
- 2. Discuss the use of symbolism to convey cultural meanings.
 - cultural symbols represent something that people in that country feel are important about the country, or part of the country
 - poppies are the symbol used for remembering the sacrifice and service of soldiers in Canada, USA, Great Britain and the Commonwealth countries
 - each country has a specific design for the symbolic poppy
- 3. View and discuss some poppy images, paying attention to the placement of shapes and use of contrast to create rhythm and a sense of movement. Look for the use of the rule of thirds in the composition of the images.
- 4. Introduce the challenge.

Activities

The Challenge

- 1. Compose a mixed media collage using the rule of thirds.
- 2. Explain the use of cultural symbolism in your work.
- 3. Use contrast and rhythm to create movement.
- 4. Demonstrate technical accomplishment and creativity.
- 5. Support your ideas with evidence found in the works.

The Process

- 1. Make sure everyone understands the challenge.
- 2. Establish success criteria with your students, for example,

I know I am successful when I have:

- used the elements of design effectively to communicate a message
- made the visual message clear and easy to understand
- used cutout letters effectively
- used contrast and rhythm to create movement
- used the rule of thirds accurately
- explained the reasons for my design choices
- explained the cultural symbolism in my composition

- kept the paper is in good condition
- 3. Guide students through the steps outlined in this lesson plan.
- 4. Observe students as they work.
- 5. Provide individual assistance and encouragement.

Sharing

- 1. Place students into small groups.
- 2. Ask them to:
 - share their work and discuss the things that are especially effective in the design and why;
 - talk about what they found satisfying about making this collage and why.
- 3. Share ideas with the whole class.
- 4. Ask students to tell how they felt about doing this project.

Assessment

- 1. Observe students as they work thoughtful focus, discriminating, seeking more information, elaborating, experimenting.
- 2. Observe students as they discuss their collages speaks with a clear voice, looks at audience while speaking, points to areas in the composition, provides accurate information, answers questions from the audience effectively.
- 3. Observe students as they listen looks at presenter, asks effective questions, supports ideas with evidence found in the artwork.
- 4. Use a checklist to track progress. (Downloads RemembranceDay tracking.pdf)
