

SHADOW ART - Colour, Shape, Pattern

Students use a small light to cast a shadow of an object they have chosen and turn the shadow into something interesting.

Required Time

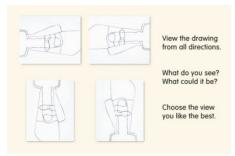

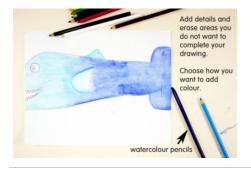
Step One

- 1. Find an object that appeals to you.
- 2. Place it at one edge of the paper.
- 3. Arrange the light so the object casts a shadow on the paper.
- 4. Play with the angles to get a good shadow.
- 5. Draw an outline of the shadow.



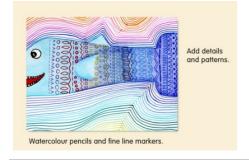
Step Two

- 1. View the drawing from all directions.
- 2. What do you see?
- 3. What could it be?
- 4. Choose the view you like the best.



Step Three

- 1. Add details and erase areas you do not want.
- 2. Choose how you want to add colour, e.g., watercolour pencils, markers, coloured pencils, crayons, etc.



Step Four

- 1. Add details and patterns.
- 2. Combine mediums, e.g., watercolour pencils and fine line markers.

Learning Goals

Students will be able to:

- position a light to cast a shadow of an object they have chosen;
- create something interesting with the shadow;
- repeat shapes and lines to create a variety of patterns;
- demonstrate technical accomplishment and creativity;
- support their ideas with evidence found in the works.

Extensions

Have students:

- explore ways to use shadows in an artwork, e.g., shadow box, shadow puppets, drawing shadows;
- create *How To* instructions to accompany their work;
- work in small groups to create a display of their work;
- share their display with others.

Prepare

- 1. Download and display the Colour, Shape and Repetition posters available on this website.
 - review or teach the element of colour analogous, complementary, monochromatic colours
 - review or teach the element of shape geometric, organic
 - review or teach the principle of repetition using similar elements over and over again
 - review or teach the principle of pattern repeating motifs in a predictable way
- 2. Gather a variety of objects.
- 3. Gather enough clip-on lights for students to share in small groups.
- 4. Test the lighting in your room to be sure the lights will cast a fairly strong shadow.
- 5. View the video by Vincent Bal a Belgian shadow artist.
- 6. Download images of shadows from the Internet.

Introduction

- 1. Cast some hand shadows and discuss how you can create new images with the way you manipulate the shadows.
- 2. View and discuss the Vincent Bal video.
- 3. Introduce the challenge.

Activities

The Challenge

- 1. Position a light to cast a shadow of an object you have chosen.
- 2. Create something interesting with the shadow.
- 3. Repeat shapes and lines to create a variety of patterns.
- 4. Demonstrate technical accomplishment and creativity.
- 5. Support your ideas with evidence found in the works.

The Process

- 1. Ensure that everyone understands the challenge.
- 2. Establish success criteria with your students, for example,

I know I am successful when I have:

- positioned a light to cast a shadow of an object
- created something interesting with my shadow
- used my own ideas
- repeated lines to make patterns
- repeated shapes to make patterns
- kept the paper in good condition
- 3. Guide students through the steps outlined in this lesson plan.
- 4. Observe students as they work.
- Provide individual assistance and encouragement.

Sharing

- 1. Once all the pictures are complete display them for a group discussion.
- 2. Place all the objects on a table so everyone can see them.

- Look closely at the artworks.
- Choose one that interests you for some reason.
- Share thoughts about the work.
- 3. Guide students by asking:
 - What object do you think was used to make this shadow drawing? What do you see that makes you say that?
 - What do you notice about the way the work has been made?
 - What do you like the best about this work?

Assessment

- 1. Observe students as they work thoughtful focus, discriminating, seeking more information, elaborating, experimenting.
- 2. Observe students as they discuss their artworks speaks with a clear voice, looks at audience while speaking, points to areas in the artwork, provides accurate information, answers questions from the audience effectively.
- 3. Observe students as they listen looks at presenter, asks effective questions, supports ideas with evidence found in the artwork.
- 4. Use a checklist to track progress. (Downloads ShadowArt_tracking.pdf)
- 5. Have students use the self-assessment form to evaluate their work. (Downloads ShadowArt self-assessment.pdf)
